

Student satisfaction in work experience remains high

Vocational routes

Most commonly discussed with young men

Apprenticeships

Young women, black respondents and those with additional needs are less likely to hear about undertaking apprenticeships

Accessing the Jobcentre

Those eligible for free school meals are the most likely to hear about this.

University

Black respondents and and those with additional needs are less likely to hear about attending university

Starting a business

Most commonly discussed with young men

4. Young people aren't being prepared

% of respondents who had discussions 5 times of more:

56% attending university

49% joining sixth form

50% attending college

% of respondents who had never had discussions:

55% starting a business

77% accessing Jobcentre provision

76% traineeships

Young people used every opportunity to tell us that they needed more one on one careers support at every stage of their journey
